

## Careers Related to Screen Printing

There are a variety of jobs directly and indirectly related to screen printing. Some of these jobs involve science and math skills such as ink formulator. Other jobs require leadership or administrative skills, such as executive director or accountant. Still other jobs are more “hands on”



such as camera operator, press operator, or screen washer.

There are even jobs requiring art ability and skill. It seems that our society is becoming more media oriented, so screen printing and other graphic



production careers will grow. For example, our society uses billions and billions of dollars worth of paper each year! As you have learned in your readings, the field is becoming more technologically oriented. For example, manual positions are now people operating equipment and

processes. However, the small business screen printing shops in towns and cities still exist. Also, images that were once all drawn by hand are being made on a computer with sophisticated drawing software. This still requires art ability, but it also requires additional skills in being able to learn different computer software and applications. Sometimes to have a career in screen printing or graphic production, you can be hired and trained by a company. However, today it is becoming more common for persons to attend universities for two or four year degrees in graphic communications and related careers. People learn to be graphic designers, desktop publishers, layout artists, paper scientists, and so on. Does any of this sound appealing to you? Hopefully, during high school you will have opportunities to explore more of your interests, likes, and dislikes. Finally deciding on a career that is rewarding and enjoyable for you is very important to your health and outlook on life.
